On Mondays and Fridays my routine may vary slightly, as the bank encourages flexible working, therefore many including myself may choose to work from home on those days if your job role allows.

I'M RESPONSIBLE FOR...

I manage projects that involve delivering a change to a certain area of the bank. I have recently taken on a project where I'm managing the deployment of a new Com-

pliance tool across numerous different countries throughout Europe, which is very exciting! A key of part of this is drawing up plans and working with various stakeholders across Europe virtually via video conferences to make it happen. I thoroughly enjoy my role, as it gives me the opportunity to deliver new changes to the bank and build relationships with lots of individuals and teams across the alobe.

I GOT MY JOB...

I graduated with a first class BA Honours degree in Business Studies. This course covered a variety of elements within business such as management, human resources (HR), marketing, finance, economics and more. Prior to my current role, at university I took a year out to complete a placement year at a law firm within their Sales & Marketing department to gain work experience. After returning to university to start my final year, I later applied, interviewed for and was lucky enough to gain a place on the HSBC Global Graduate scheme. Here I rotated around the bank in various roles and locations in the UK over two

Services years, to gain experience/ **Project** knowledge and Manager help me decide where I wanted to work within the bank. After completing this I attended internal career fairs, searched the internal career portal for available opportunities, and gained a position as a Business Analyst for two years. 
MY ROLE MODEL **GROWING UP WAS...**
